FORUM GOALS

This event will also be the occasion for the International Conservation Caucus (ICC) Bicameral Hearing. While there are many achievements to celebrate, this is a critical juncture for maintaining and increasing long-term U.S. support for the CBFP. The Forum will raise the profile of the CBFP in the United States, as U.S. programs progress from landscape planning to full implementation, while meeting new challenges and opportunities. Specific goals include:

- 1. highlight the successes of the CBFP as a regional forest conservation partnership fostering sustainable natural resource use, peace, and stability in the region, and to provide an honest appraisal of progress on the ground;
- 2. provide an opportunity for these Heads of State and/or Senior Ministerial Representatives to present their vision for the years ahead to the US Congress and the Obama Administration, touching on identified needs for future technical assistance to address priority issues in the forest sector;
- 3. raise support for future investment and commitment from current as well as new partners.

CENTRAL AFRICAN REGIONAL PROGRAM FOR THE ENVIROMENT

The Central African Regional Program for the Environment (CARPE), is a long-term initiative by USAID to promote sustainable natural resource management in the Congo Basin by supporting increased local, national, and regional natural resource management capacity. CARPE is the U.S. Government's primary means of administering and funding its contributions to the CBFP activities. Under the CBFP program, 294,000 square miles, an area larger than Texas, of terrestrial, freshwater, and marine habitats of biological significance are under improved management, and the rate of biodiversity loss in these areas is being greatly reduced.

FORUM HOST - ICCF

The ICCF is the strongest association of public and private sector representatives in the U.S. dedicated to international conservation. Inspired by a belief that conservation is



necessary for sustainable development and fundamental to poverty alleviation, conflict avoidance, good governance, and regional security, ICCF believes it is in America's interest to expand its leadership in the world to promote sound, long-term policies of sustainable land, water, and biodiversity management.

The ICCF works closely with the leadership of the U.S. Congressional ICC and other policy makers around the world, educating with good science and demonstrations of how successful models of public-private partnerships in conservation can successfully protect biodiversity and conserve natural resources while, most importantly, still providing economic and social benefits to people that rely on them for their survival.
