

Anti-poaching development & support: Georges Nunes assisted the team to review existing patrolling procedures and compile Standard Operating Procedures for anti-poaching interventions. Participation in a technology and communications conference at Akagera National Park. Team members received training on collection, analyses and exploitation of information from poaching networks.

WILDLIFE CRIME UNIT

WCU operations:





two operations conducted leading to the arrest of two suspect.

One new analyst recruited; WCU capacity building on collection, analyses and exploitation of information from poaching networks provided by New Century; Liaise with Director of Ouesso Prison following two prison breaks.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

- o Provision of school supplies for teachers at the Bomassa school for the school year 2017-2018.
- o Medical visits to Kabo for 13 women, amongst which 12 for baby vaccinations (9 Bantu and 3 indigenous) and one pregnant woman (indigenous) for an antenatal consultation.
- o Fishermen in villages and settlements along the Sangha River between Bomassa and Lémé were trained on the construction of smoking ovens and their use. A total of 115 people participated in this training, including 89 men (73 Bantu, 16 indigenous) and 27 women (18 Bantu, 9 indigenous).

RESEARCH AND MONITORING

Big Trees Project: Dr David Harris arrived in PNNN to launch the project and two new research assistants were hired on short-term contracts to complete the pilot study until March 2018, Ferré Mboussa and Noé Madingou. Except for some commercial timber species, very little is known about the abundance, density, and diversity of big trees and lianas in African rainforests.

Wildlife Health Program: The construction of the new parrot cages at Bomassa commenced. The new cages will be able to house 400 parrots and are on track to be completed before the busiest parrot capture season.



Mondika: Another leopard attack is suspected to have occurred in Kingo's group; honey pounding by a wild chimp observed near Kingo's group; research assistants trained on dung sample collection and preparation.



Mbeli Bai Study: Fighting observed between old dominant male buffalo, Jupiter, and new male, Aris. Jupiter has not been seen since and it appears that Aris has taken over the herd.



Goualougo Triangle Ape Project:

Observation of one of the female chimpanzees in the Moto group feeding on a baby chimpanzee that she is suspected to have killed.

AVIATION PROGRAM

<u>Surveillance flights:</u> O. <u>Logistics flights:</u> O. (Pilot on annual leave). Sixty barrels of Aviation Gas was ordered. Authorisation obtained from Congolese Civil Aviation Authorities allowing the WCS plane to use the Makao/Thanry aerodrome until May 2018.
